Infectious diseases such as highly pathogenic avian influenza, rabies, and anthrax threaten human and animal life in Southeast Asia. SEAOHUN improves the ability of universities and the current and future workforce to prevent, detect, and respond to infectious disease threats.

We facilitate joint activities and projects among network members, emphasizing partnerships that cross technical disciplines as well as national borders. We facilitate student and staff exchanges, develop curriculums on One Health related subjects, and strengthen and develop teaching methodologies to build the next generation of health leaders.

About One Health Workforce

The One Health Workforce project is developing a health workforce that can prevent, detect and respond to the threat of infectious diseases around the world. The project is part of the USAID Emerging Pandemic Threats 2 program, which focuses on the cross-sectoral disease surveillance, training and outbreak response.

Teams at the University of Minnesota and Tufts University provide support to two One Health networks: SEAOHUN and the One Health Central and Eastern Africa (OHCEA). With One Health Workforce, these university networks are leveraged to transform their regional health workforce.



The 'One Health' approach acknowledges that the health of humans, animals, and the environment are inextricably linked.
